President's Message

Now that the warm days are here the bees are building up nicely. As stated before, everything you need to know about a hive can be learned from watching the front entrance. Lots of bees coming in with overloaded pollen baskets will definitely inspire the happy beekeeper dance and this time of year should also point to a substantial nectar flow.

We have seen a fair number of swarms this year and I have had 4 come out of my Lafayette bee yard to date. They just love the swarm trap I have there. I personally have never



considered swarming to be a bad thing as you have a good opportunity to catch the swarm and install them into your equipment making for an easy split, or if this is not possible you are populating your local area with bees that will ultimately help with local genetic diversity.

It has always been my way to try and figure out why my bees swarmed and try to do things a bit different so that perhaps they won't next year. Swarming is a sign of a healthy hive and is the natural process for the hive and results in a new queen.

At our recent meeting in May at the School of Conservation we had Tim Schuler, the New Jersey state bee inspector, talk to us about the current status or New Jersey's beekeepers. I was truly impressed with his custom power point presentation showing the different mite treatments and the percentage of success related to overwintering with those treatments.....Thanks Tim.

Tim was also able to demonstrate some good hive splitting techniques as well as show how to help out a weak hive by adding a few frames of brood from the donor hive. I do love to watch other dedicated experienced beekeepers work as I always learn something new.

A special thanks goes out to Roman Osadca for donating a hive for Tim Schuler's demonstration. From what I understand Roman had quite an adventure bringing the hive up to the SOC-two thousand friendly bees looking to distract you while you're driving is always a fun time.

The fair will be here before you know it. We have a fair committee headed up by Deb Cowell and still could use a few more committee members to help out with all the preparation tasks please reach out to her if you can help.
